This month I am delighted to introduce some of the key developments and progress across the sector in Lincolnshire in our Food Sector Bulletin, as well as sharing some very exciting news for Young's and the job creation opportunities this brings to the region.

Following expansion of our production lines through our accelerated growth plans, we are currently looking for more than 400 new recruits across a variety of factory-based roles in Grimsby, including as production operatives at Humberstone Road, at The Docks and across the wider estate.

These jobs have been driven by an increased demand for Young's products and will increase the head count in the town to 3,000 from 2,500 by the end of 2021.

Our production operative roles require no previous experience of working in a fish or food manufacturing environment, but we want a willingness to learn, the right attitude and a desire to succeed. Professional and personal growth is very important to us and we have many opportunities for development for those who work with us. We're also keen to promote from within wherever possible.

These roles are fantastic for the region and we're proud to be able to support the local community, especially during the tough economic landscape, and to start to drive the economy back towards

recovery. We are pleased to be able to grow our team, create skilled jobs and continue to help inspire our nation to love and eat healthy fish that's made in the region, now and for generations to come.

Trusted Bytes

A ground-breaking collaborative project funded by Innovate UK, Trusted Bytes aims to boost supply chain productivity across the fresh produce sector by establishing an industry-wide system for trusted data exchange.

The £2.8m Trusted Bytes project will use novel digital technology that connects the supply chain with central government and other critical partners to help facilitate the flow of goods across international borders and drive productivity within the UK food economy. This includes the development of technology that creates immutable proof of food provenance, digitises critical border transfer processes, develops the world's first trust framework to govern trustworthy data exchange and sharing across the full food supply chain, alongside novel telecommunications technologies that provide seamless real-time digital connectivity for supply chain operators.

The consortium, led by Produce Logistics Limited includes leading fresh produce supply chain operators Fesa UK Ltd; Worldwide Fruit Ltd; Davis Worldwide Ltd; Hain Daniels; FreshLinc Ltd; and ukFPN Lincolnshire, supported by technology companies Contained Technologies UK Ltd; British Standards Institution (BSI); and Accelerate Technology Ltd, as well as the University of Lincoln, UK; the High Value Manufacturing Catapult's Manufacturing Technology Centre; and the Satellite Applications Catapult.

Contained Technologies' BlueRing software is at the heart of the project, and it is designed to integrate external systems, such as HMRC, quickly and easily. It will be extended by a new BSI standard to enable businesses to automate the Authorised Economic Operator (AEO) certification process. A further challenge for the rural food sector will be addressed by ubiquitous end-to-end telecommunications developed by Excelerate Technologies Ltd.

Trusted Bytes will deliver a complete service that can integrate across multiple enterprise resource planning (ERP) systems, from order to compliance and submission. The information will be made available on a transparent data sharing platform that tracks conditions and location, as well as enabling this data to be easily ingested into their forms, templates, and enterprise business and procurement

systems. This integration is crucial for businesses seeking to streamline their processes and regulatory compliance.

Alex Szymborski, Contained Technologies UK Ltd, said: "I am delighted to lead the Innovate UK funded Trusted Bytes project; helping to create critical innovation in the food supply chain to bring about long-term benefits in trust, security and resilience. This is a great team, with an abundance of skills from technology and industry, bringing together the very best of Britain.

Professor Simon Pearson, Director of the Lincoln Institute for Agri-food Technology at the University of Lincoln, commented: "Given the changes to UK terms of trade post Brexit, this project is extremely timely. We hope to provide technology to help the flow of the fresh produce trade but also lead innovation to establish the trusted sharing of data in complex supply chains."

Angie Stuart, UKFPN Lincolnshire said: "This is a major achievement and another great example of the level of innovation found within the fresh produce industry in South Lincolnshire. We're super excited to be working on this project with our members and partners."

New Branston Factory to Make Protein from Low Value Potatoes

Work has started on a new £6m facility, which will be used to extract high grade plant protein from potatoes, at Branston's site in Lincolnshire.

Branston is working alongside B-hive Innovations as part of a collaborative project to improve potato crop utilisation. The commercial factory is the first of its kind in the UK and will see the introduction of bespoke technologies and capabilities to meet the growing demand for UK grown plant-based ingredients.

The facility will convert low-value potatoes into clean-label functional protein, which can be used in vegetarian and vegan foods. It will also generate starch-based products for a range of manufacturing applications.

The project is being headed up by the newly appointed managing director of the Branston's Prepared Foods division, Richard Fell, as a key part of his focus on transforming the Prepared business.



Richard said: "We're delighted to be working with B-hive Innovations on this new venture. Most people are aware of potato starch and fibre in potatoes, but they don't consider the highly nutritious protein fraction.

"B-hive Innovations has been honing this technology for a number of years, working with a group of academic and industry partners and supported by Innovate UK. They have developed a process to gently extract and isolate high-grade proteins from potatoes. This means we have the potential to meet the growing requirements from food manufacturers for 100% plant-based protein that is free from allergens and is fully traceable from our UK grown crops."

HSH Coldstores Plans for Expansion in Grimsby

HSH Coldstores, part of Constellation Cold Logistics, which is Europe's largest cold store operator with 13 sites in 4 European countries has announced plans for an expansion in Grimsby.

HSH Coldstores has more than 50 years of experience in the storage and distribution sector. Earlier this year it joined the Constellation Cold Logistics platform, a network of market-leading cold storage and logistics businesses across Europe. HSH's sister company, SAL Commercials, coordinates the transport element of the business and operates more than 40 refrigerated vehicles across the four existing sites, collectively travelling more than two million miles for customers annually.

Plans have been submitted for a £15m development which will create up to 50 jobs at the leading business park on the south bank of the Humber, in the UK. When completed, the state of-the art facility at Europarc business park will increase HSH Coldstores' capacity in Grimsby by over 30,000 pallet positions.

The development is expected to create 50 jobs across numerous roles including multi-skilled coldstore operatives, stock office administrators and LGV drivers.

Anthony Howard, Managing Director of HSH Coldstores, said: "This expansion is needed due to increasing demand for storage from existing and potential new customers. "I'm thrilled that we're expanding and planning our exciting new facility. Europarc is the perfect location, with its fantastic road links and other food-based businesses on site. "We're really proud to be working in partnership with Wykeland to invest in the local community and boost the economy. "It's fantastic we're in a position to expand in the current climate, but it's only possible because of the hard work and dedication of our whole team."

The new facility will achieve a BREEAM "very good" rating for sustainability and will incorporate extensive solar panels to generate a portion of energy needs. Subject to planning consent, HSH Coldstores is aiming for it to be operational in the first quarter of 2022.

Professor Simon Pearson Appointed to Co-Chair Horticultural Automation Review

DEFRA is currently leading a review into automation in horticulture which will report on ways to increase automation in the sector and reduce the need for migrant seasonal labour.

Professor Simon Pearson, Director of the Lincoln Institute for AgriFood Technology (LIAT) at the University of Lincoln, and a Greater Lincolnshire LEP Food Board member, has been appointed to cochair of the horticulture automation review and said: "I am delighted to be co-chairing this extremely important review alongside the Rt. Hon. George Eustice MP, Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, and look forward to working with colleagues at Defra on the final report due for publication later this year."

Simon's new role builds on his track record in the last five years of developing the LIAT team, based at the Riseholme Campus North of Lincoln, into Europe's largest team focused on agri-food robotics and the digitalisation of the Food Chain.

Midlands Engine Report on Food Chain Resilience



A University of Lincoln team led by Professor Charbel Jose Chiappetta Jabbour, Dr. David Twigg, Liz Price, Professor Martin Hingley, and Martin Collison (Lincoln International Business School, University of Lincoln), have recently completed a review of how the food chain coped with Covid-19 and the capabilities it used in response to the pandemic.

The review found that the UK food supply chain was able to cope well with the pressures put on it by COVID-19, which included the dramatic contraction of 'food to go' sector and food services, and an acute increase in food stockpiling by households and retail demand.

The research findings helped build a portfolio of resilience capability factors, the ACURSC (Anti-COVID-19 Capabilities Underpinning Resilient Supply Chains) Framework, which identifies that the main capabilities which enabled the food chain to cope with Covid included:

- Organisation, defined as having effective human resource structures, policies, skills and culture.
- Anticipation, which means the ability to identify potential future disruptive events or situations and to have plans in place to cope when disruptive events occur.

- Adaptability, meaning the organisational ability to quickly modify operations in response to challenges or opportunities.
- Flexibility in order fulfilment, which means quickly changing outputs or the mode of delivering outputs (e.g. moving production from food service to food retail markets or online sales).
- Flexibility in sourcing, with the ability to quickly change production inputs and raw materials when supply chains were disrupted.

It also emerged that the most resilient firms had a few common distinctive characteristics such as a proactive entrepreneurial mindset which helped them respond effectively. Commenting on the review, the authors report that they were struck by just how fast the response had been by our food businesses to the Covid crisis in 2020 and how they had gone well beyond what they were asked to do by government to ensure they both kept their staff safe and the country fed. The industry can be rightly proud of how resilient it was and this stands it in very good stead for the future.

The Greater Lincolnshire HPO

The Greater Lincolnshire High Potential Opportunity (HPO) for Automation in Food Processing will be launched with the Department for International Trade (DIT) on 27th May in two webinars: early morning for countries East of the UK and late afternoon for the Americas. The purpose of the HPO, which includes 30 detailed slides on Lincolnshire's thriving food sector and its cluster of automation expertise, is to attract further investment to the region.

DIT will use it with potential investors to promote the opportunities in our region and to signpost then to the support and assistance which is available locally.



AgriFood Sector Investment Proposition

NATIONAL NEWS

FSA Report on Food in a Pandemic

The FSA working with Demos, interviewed over 10,000 consumers to assess how the pandemic has changed their food buying habits. The report details a wide range of changes including:

- Food insecurity: people have stepped in to help prevent new forms of food insecurity caused by people self-isolating by offering informal support such as shopping for others. There is a public appetite for the government to take action to help feed those without the means to feed themselves. People also tend to be more supportive of preventative actions for food insecurity, such as ensuring well-paid jobs are available to all. Just under two thirds (63%) that 'it is the government's responsibility to make sure no-one goes hungry'.
- UK food supply: a significant proportion of the population have bought food more locally or grown more food during the pandemic, reflecting a wider move towards individual self-sufficiency. 78% of those surveyed supported the UK keeping its current food quality standards, even if food is more expensive and less competitive in the global market. A similar proportion (82%) also supported maintaining the UK's current animal welfare standards.
- Diet and eating habits: there has been a complex shift in people's diets during Covid-19, with more home cooking. Although a third (32%) of respondents in the poll reported eating more healthy main meals, a third (33%) ate more unhealthy snacks. Those who have cooked more or eaten healthier main meals tend to expect this change to continue. However, this is likely to be somewhat dependent on the other changes, such as continued flexible working.

EU VAT Changes

In response to numerous enquiries from East Midlands businesses regarding the EU VAT eCommerce package coming into effect from 1st July, DIT East Midlands and EU VAT specialist Ellen Main Jeffrey from <u>JustVAT</u> will be on hand to offer insight and answer your questions.

The EU has been looking at ways to streamline VAT accounting for both EU VAT registered businesses and non-EU businesses selling into the EU and make it easier for individual sellers to report VAT and from 1st July 2021, the EU VAT eCommerce Package will launch. This means that B2C eCommerce sellers and eMarketplaces will face new VAT obligation reforms initiated by the 27 member states of the European Union.

The primary changes for B2C sellers from 1st July are:

- 1. Simplified OSS (One Stop Shop) VAT return for EU VAT registered businesses selling cross-border within the EU
- 2. Ending of the low-value import VAT exemption and the new IOSS (Import One Stop Shop) for non-EU businesses selling into the EU
- 3. New rules for e-commerce whereby eMarketplaces will in some cases become the deemed VAT supplier and responsible for charging and collecting VAT on deemed supplier transactions
- 4. VAT obligations using Amazon's Pan-EU FBA and deferred VAT accounts for the EU.
